Prof Adelaide Lusambili (PhD, MA, MS/MH).

I am an educator, a climate change adaptation and health system research scientist, and a policy expert with over 18 years of experience working in the UK and several African countries. I am the lead for the Environmental Health and Governance Centre at the Africa International University. My academic research journey has taken me down many paths.

I started my early career as a successful accountant and administrator with an international organisation and abandoned it after five years to satisfy my thirst for a scientist. As an educator, I teach social behavioural theories, qualitative research methods, systematic reviews, culture and public health modules and recently, climate change and health.

My doctoral dissertation at American University, USA and postdoctoral research at the Institute of Development Studies (IDS/UK) focused on the gendered impact of environmental sanitation and water in the slums of Kibera (Kenya). In particular, I examined behaviours around waste disposal (flying toilets) and their health impacts.

Between 2009 and 2016, I worked with National Health Services (NHS/UK) with various partners, including Sheffield H University and Bradford Institute of Health Research/UK, on various ageing research themes, including Fuel Poverty and ageing; physical activities and ageing; isolation in patients living with Alzheimer and dementia diseases. I also worked on issues of refugees and migrants in the context of COVID-19 and refugee children's mental health outcomes in the UK.

Since 2017, I have worked in sub-Saharan Africa (SSA) as a senior researcher/lecturer at Strathmore University, senior postdoc at Kemri Wellcome Trust and more recently, Ass a professor at the Aga Khan University. During this period, I have designed and led various streams of research, including reproductive, Maternal, Neonatal, and Child Health (RMNCH), health systems strengthening, access to and delivery of health care services, mortality audits, the impact of COVID-19 on refugee women, health professional communication, and systems failures of high-risk pregnancies. I have worked with communities to codesign culturally contextualised solutions.

From 2020, through the CHAMNHA consortium (https://www.lshtm.ac.uk/research/centres-projects-groups/chamnha#who-we-are), I was the Kenya lead field investigator on a climate change and health research that focussed on understanding climate change-related extreme heat exposure effects and MNCH on the east coast of Kenya. I have worked with communities to codesign and develop priority interventions to reduce heat effects on women and their neonates. I have presented my research at several international conferences, including COP26 (Scotland), COP27 (Egypt), and AHAIC (Kigali), among others. I have published 51 peer-reviewed papers and am a member of several scientific organisations. I hold a PhD in medical anthropology and a Master's in Sociology (gender and development) from the American University of Washington, DC. I also have an MS/Mental Health from the University of Sheffield/UK. I am versed in the art of developing curricula and grant writing. I have supervised 48 master's students and several PHDs in supervision. I love mentoring young researchers and walking in the woods.
