# EDUTAINMENT FUNDRAISER

Benjamin Franklin, an American polymath and one of the founding fathers of U.S, clearly pitches, “An investment in knowledge pays the best interest.”

In Kenya, the education sector has experienced exponential growth since introduction of Free Primary Education (FPE) and Free Secondary Education (FSE). More and more students can now access basic education. The transition rate from high school to higher education has also grown. Education in higher education is partly funded by the government since the start of cost sharing in early 1990's.

## **Government funding through students' loans is not enough to meet all students' needs.**

Parents rely on community mobilization funds drive and constituency development funds which yield very low returns. This can be attributed to low income in families due to slow economic growth.

These circumstances come with challenges among university students and Africa International University is not exempted. The university has about 50 students who are orphaned and/or extremely needy. They lack tuition and/or living expenses' support. Most of these students were supported by well-wishers for their secondary school education.

**Africa International University (AIU) wishes to launch a fundraiser for 50 orphaned and needy students to go through their university education.**

AIU has more than 100 financially needy student (orphaned and vulnerable). Some go hungry for 2-3 days, others for a couple of meals and all often defer taking exams due to non-payment of exam fees. The AIU community has had a benevolence fund for students since the late 90's. In the recent past with a growing number of orphans and needy students, the kitty is running out very fast.

While some students receive Higher Education Loan's Board support, the funds are not usually enough; many students struggle to make ends meet with both tuition and living expenses. Some students do not receive any HELB loans even after applying.

For this reason, AIU is organizing a funds drive under the theme: Ensuring Accessibility of Education to All. Funds collected will go towards supporting vulnerable students at the university.

The university is organizing an entertainment event which will also educate the public at the same time, hence branded – Edutainment Fundraiser. The items for presentation will explore the theme Ensuring Accessibility of Education to All. It is envisaged that the funds raised will be able to educate over 50 orphaned and needy to meet their basic right to education, food and decent living. Hence, the branding – Edutainment Fundraiser.

Youth from universities and high schools will be encouraged to showcase their talents to create pieces of music, dance, painting and tapestry, among others, to address the theme. After a vetting process, the best pieces will be presented during the event. The much-hyped event is on 8th June 2019.

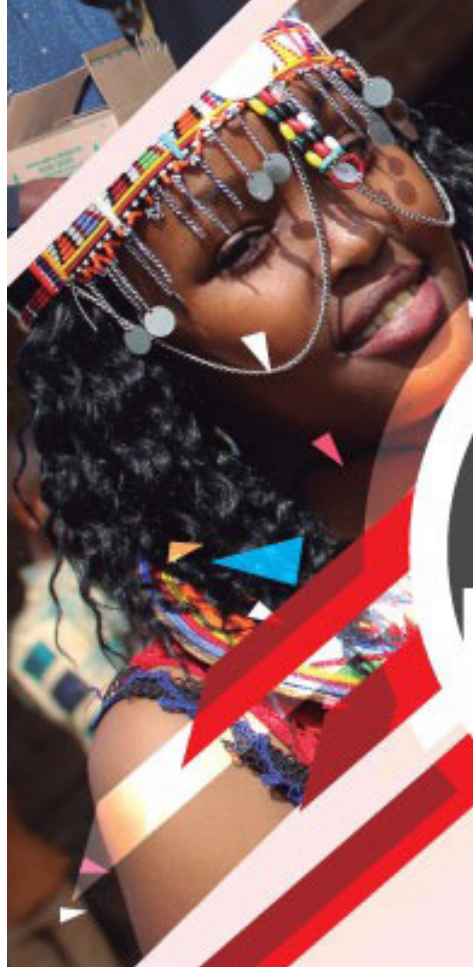

## Welcome to Narcissism

We often run to our screens to recreate love only to become lovers of ourselves. We keep running back to our social media statuses to inspect people who viewed our posts. On the one hand we feel validated or accepted when our friends like our posts. On the other hand we feel anxious when we realize that some of our friends did not like or even view our posts. We are becoming more narcissistic without realizing it.





We can never build strong communities with the self-centered attitude which social media encourages in us. Community is built on love and there can never be love without humility. A humble person is honest with himself and with others. A humble person does not seek to pretend to be someone he is not. Jaron Lanier adds that “social media makes you meaningless. Other people are also becoming meaningless; you understand less about what’s going on with them.”

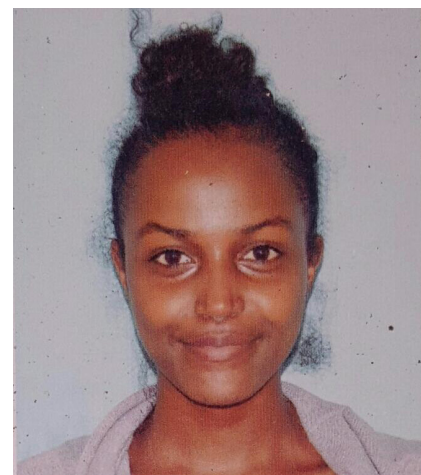

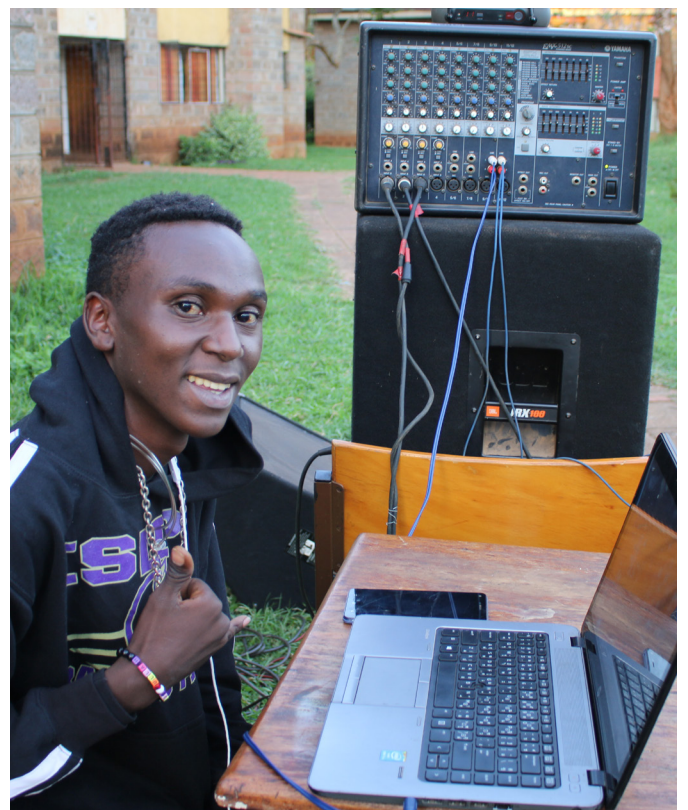
